## Green Bay Metro Fire Department-Allouez Station

Ambulance providers, such as the Green Bay Metro Fire Department, often respond to medical calls that involve a person that is unconscious or unable to speak for various reasons. This can make things difficult for medical providers as a patient's medical history often aid in treatment. The lack of a patient's medical information and medical history can cause difficulties.

Often times, family and friends on the scene are able to provide us with what we need. For those times when a patient is alone, unconscious, or unable to speak during a medical emergency, we can rely on ICE. I'm not talking about the frozen cubes that you put into your glass to keep your beverage cold. I am referring to In Case of Emergency (ICE). ICE is an emergency contact phone number for a spouse, friend, or relative that you program into your cell phone under the contact name ICE.

If emergency responders like firefighters, paramedics, EMT's, or police officers should happen to find a person unconscious or in a serious accident, they can use your cell phone to call your ICE contact to obtain essential medical information about you. Your ICE contact should be able to provide information such as; your age, medicine that you take, food and medicine allergies, and any medical conditions that you might have. You can also store more than one ICE contact in your phone by using ICE1, ICE2, ICE spouse, or ICE mom.

ICE was started in Brittan by a paramedic in 2005 and has slowly been implemented in the United States. Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classes in our area are even telling their students to look for ICE contacts in patient's cell phones if they need to. We are urging people to put an ICE contact into their cell phone and tell at least 10 friends or family members about this excellent program.

For those that continue to resist the temptation of a cell phone and modern technology, there is still a way for you to participate in ICE! Make a card for your wallet with ICE in bold letters with a contact to call. You could also include some of your medical information and allergies if you wanted to.

- *March 1st: Deputy J. Sanford responded to a residence on Oakwood Ave. for a scam complaint. The caller reported she is getting multiple calls from an unknown company asking for her deceased husband to call them for a debt. The complainant states she informed the company this person does not live here and the company stated they will send a representative at noon. Deputy J. Sanford arrived and they spoke at length about scam calls. Extra patrol requested for the area. No identity information given to suspects by complainant.*
- *March 4th: Deputy J. Rousseau responded to a residence on E. Mission Rd. for a report of broken vehicle window that had possibly been shot out with a BB gun. The incident occurred in the 400 block of E. Mission Rd with the victim's vehicle parked in the driveway. No suspects at this time. Report completed and Deputy Rousseau completing follow up at this time.*
- *March 6th: Deputy D. Fameree responded to Jimmy Seas for a theft report. The complainant stated she declined 2 credit cards that the suspect gave to the bartender. The suspect was informed the credit cards were denied and then proceeded to run out of the building. Report completed with follow up needed. A jacket was left on scene with drug paraphernalia found inside.*
- *March 15th: Deputy Rousseau responded to a residence on Taft St for a fraud complaint. The victim reported someone had used their social security number to file their taxes. A written statement was obtained and a report was completed. No suspect at this time.*
- *March 20th: Deputy Sanford responded to an address in the 500 block of Clover Ln. for a Criminal Damage to Property report. The caller reported that the side mirror to her vehicle had been broken. The vehicle was parked in her driveway overnight. No other evidence left on scene. Report completed with an extra patrol request for area.*
- *March 31st: Deputy K. Mason responded to the Wells Fargo Bank on a fraud complaint. The teller advised someone had come in and attempted to fraudulently cash in a check by using a fraudulent Driver's License and social security card. Deputy Mason conducting an investigation resulting in learning a young female had attempted to cash in one of her father's checks. The father/victim refused to press charges at this time as the check was not cashed. Deputy Mason documented the incident and was able to speak with all parties in person.*
- **In the month of March 2016, Deputies responded to or initiated approximately 559 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 192 Traffic Stops, 27 traffic crashes, 17 disturbances, and 21 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.**

**Item #1**

On March 1st, Deputy E. Mueller and other Deputies responded to a report of a two car accident on the crest of the STH 172 bridge. The vehicles were unable to move out of traffic. An accident report was completed with the driver at fault receiving a citation for driving too fast for conditions.

**Item #2**

On March 2nd, Deputy J. Sanford responded to Webster Elementary for a report of theft of student's medication. This theft is in part of a multiple jurisdiction and school investigation on a known suspect. Deputy Sanford obtained a statement from one of the complainant and completed a report. This report was forwarded to the BCSO and Green Bay investigative division.

**Item #3**

On March 13th, Deputy C. Brown performed a traffic stop on Riverside Dr at St. Joseph St. The vehicle was observed performing an unsafe lane deviation. The suspect driver was later arrested for OWI. The suspect driver was also issued citations for unsafe lane deviation and possession of drug paraphernalia.

**Item #4**

On March 15th, Deputy Rousseau and Deputy R. Crozier responded to a residence in the 300 block of Iroquois Ave. for a welfare check on an elderly female. No one answered the door at the house. Upon investigation, Deputies learned the female in question was currently staying at a local hospital for an extended period of time. Notification made to the complainant.

**Item #5**

On March 18th, Deputy C. Brown observed a suspicious vehicle inside the Allouez Catholic Cemetery during late nighttime hours. Deputy Brown identified the occupants of the vehicle and obtained a consented search by the vehicles owner. A controlled substance and drug paraphernalia were located inside the vehicle. The driver of the vehicle admitted to owning these items and was issued subsequent citations.

**Item #6**

On March 21st, Deputy Rousseau responded to the 200 block of Kenney St for an abandoned vehicle complaint. The complainant stated the vehicle has been parked there for weeks. The vehicle was tagged for 24 hour removal. Attempts were made to find/contact registered owner. Deputy Rousseau was not able to contact the owner outside of the 24 hours. Glens Towing was later contacted and removed the abandoned vehicle.

**Item #7**

On March 23rd, Deputy Brown and Deputy J. Rapp responded to Riverside Dr at Allouez Terrace for a hit and run accident. Deputy Brown conducted an investigation that same night and was able to locate the run driver. The driver stated he fled the scene because he was scared due to not having a valid driver's license. Citations issued to the driver for Hit and Run, Operating motor vehicle without a valid driver's license, and driving too fast for conditions.

**Item #8**

On March 27th, Deputy Brown performed a traffic stop on a vehicle speeding on Riverside Dr at St Joseph St. Deputy Brown observed signs that the operator may have

been drinking. Sgt. Lau and Deputy P. Belleau responded to the scene as they were working an OWI Alcohol Task Force grant through the state. A sobriety field test was performed resulting in the operator not being over the legal limit but were issued citations for Absolute Sobriety and Underage Drinking. Deputy Brown issued citations for speeding and an underage person transporting intoxicants in a motor vehicle.

**Item #9**

On March 30, Deputy Mason responded to the Prevea Clinic at 1821 S Webster Ave for a report of theft. It was reported 2 males had stolen multiple pairs of glasses from the optical department. Deputy Mason was able to contact the 2 suspects. The suspects were cooperative and apologized for stealing the glasses. Deputy Mason issued both individuals with Village of Allouez municipal citations for theft.
