Allouez Deputies for 2014

Each year Brown County Sheriff's Office Deputies have the opportunity to pick what shift or area they want to work. Deputies work a six days on-three days off rotation. As in past years we will have some new faces working in Allouez for 2014.

-Deputy Randy VonHaden remains the primary dayshift officer.

-Deputy Joe Mleziva will replace Deputy Justin Raska as the primary PM shift officer. Deputy Mleziva is originally from the Casco area and is a 2011 graduate of U.W. Stevens Point. Deputy Mleziva attended the Fox Valley Technical College Law Enforcement Academy in summer of 2012 and started with the Sheriff's Office in April of 2013.

-Deputy Marc Shield will replace Deputy Eric Linsmeyer as the primary night shift officer. Deputy Shield was born and raised in Bellevue, is a 2012 Graduate of Elmhurst College (outside Chicago), attended the NWTC Law Enforcement Academy, and began with the Sheriff's Office in 2013.

-Deputy Jason Vogel remains the Day/Pm shift relief officer. Deputy Vogel fills in on VonHaden and Mleziva's days off.

-Deputy Karisa Verheyen will replace Deputy Nick Olmsted as the night shift relief. Verheyen will fill in for Shield's three days off and fill in for the night shift Bellevue officer for her other three days. Deputy Verheyen was born and raised in the Howard/Suamico area, is a 2010 graduate of UWGB, interned with the Green Bay Police Department, attended the NWTC Law Enforcement Academy in 2011, and started with the Sheriff's Office in January 2012.

-Deputy Raska has received an assignment as a Directed Enforcement Office in the Village of Suamico starting January 2014. Deputies Linsmeyer and Olmsted both took assignments with the investigative division. We wish them the best in their new assignments.

Green Bay Metro Fire Department-Allouez Station

January and February are usually the coldest time of year for us in Wisconsin. Cold temperatures are not only hard on our bodies, but can be tough on our cars as well. Many of us have experienced, or will experience, some type of cold weather related vehicle breakdown during our lives. Proper vehicle maintenance, such as ensuring correct fluid levels and maintaining at least a half a tank of gas in your vehicle, will help you to avoid a breakdown.

Everyone should have a cold-weather emergency kit in their vehicle in the winter. Here are some things your kit should contain:

- * Flashlight with extra batteries
- * Battery powered radio to hear the weather forecast or any emergency announcements
 - * Some heavy blankets
 - * Extra gloves and hat, heavy sweatshirts and socks
- * Small snow shovel and kitty litter. This can be used for added traction in the snow.
 - * Non perishable foods for energy and bottled water
 - * Jumper cables
 - * A tow strap
 - * Warning light or road flares
- * Water-proof matches or lighter and a candle in a coffee can
 - * Snow scraper/brush
 - * First Aid Kit
 - * Chemical heat packs

If you should happen to get stranded, your best bet is to stay put and call for help on a cell phone. Here are some more tips:

- * Do not leave the car unless help is visible within 100 yards
- * Do not eat snow (it lowers your body temperature)
- * Raise the hood and display something bright on the antenna
- * To keep warm, run your car engine 10 minutes every hour
- * Keep the exhaust pipe clear of snow to avoid carbon monoxide poisoning

- ***December 4th:** Deputy Raska responded to a residence on Ontonagon Ct. for a theft complaint. The caller reported the theft of a Christmas ornament and her doorbell being rung several times. No suspects at this time.*

- ***December 19th:** Deputy Vogel responded to an address in the 2300 block of Greenwald St. for a theft report. The caller reported that her I.D. and debit card were missing from her purse. I was not known exactly when or where the items went missing. Report completed-no suspects at this time.*
- ***In the month of December** Deputies responded to or initiated approximately 552 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 123 traffic stops, 61 traffic crashes, 17 disturbances, and 14 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.*

Item #1

On December 1, Deputy Linsmeyer stopped a suspicious vehicle in the area of Grande Rue and Broadview. Upon speaking with the occupants of the vehicle Deputy Linsmeyer observed the odor of marijuana in the vehicle. A search of the vehicle resulted in the seizure of a small amount of marijuana. The driver of the vehicle was cited for possession of marijuana.

Item #2

On December 3, Deputy Vogel responded to Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft complaint. Store employees had stopped a male party after witnessing him steal items. The male admitted to taking items and was issued a citation for retail theft.

Item #3

On December 6, Deputy VonHaden stopped a vehicle on St. Joseph St at Webster Ave for a registration violation. The operator of the vehicle was found to have no valid license and warrants for her arrest. The female was arrested for the warrant and issued several traffic citations.

Item #4

On December 13, Deputy Raska and Deputy Loppnow responded to an address on Karen Ln. to attempt to locate a male party with an Allouez warrant. The male was located and arrested for the warrant.

Item #5

On December 17, Deputy Loppnow conducted a traffic stop on the ramp from Webster Ave to HWY 172 westbound for a brake light violation. A passenger in the vehicle was found to have warrants for his arrest. The operator of the vehicle was issued several traffic citations and the passenger was arrested for his outstanding warrant.

Item #6

On December 21, Deputy Raska along with other Deputies responded to an address in the 2700 block of Beaumont St. for a disturbance call. After further investigation it was found that a disturbance had taken place between a male and female and that the male had left. The male was later located and arrested for disorderly conduct.

Item #7

On December 22, Deputy Vogel and other deputies responded to the Shell Gas Station on Webster Avenue for a burglary complaint. The caller reported that the clerk had been robbed and that the suspect had already fled. Witnesses did describe a suspect vehicle which was located a short time later at the Huber Jail on Adams Street. The suspect was located at the Huber Jail and arrested a short time later.
