Information for Allouez Residents

As mentioned in past years, local Law Enforcement Agencies have recently been participating in Speed /Seat Belt/OWI Task Force unit operations. Participating agencies join together and focus on specific area to conduct enforcement. All overtime for officers is funded by the state. In June, there was a Speed Task Force operation that focused on Allouez and Bellevue. There will be several more of these operations in Allouez in the coming months. If you see a squad car from a neighboring Agency, such as the Ashwaubenon Police Dept., in Allouez they are likely here as part of one of these Task Forces.

Landlord Alert Program

The Brown County Sheriff's Office Landlord Alert Program allows you to receive an e-mail notification of any police calls at a given address. The purpose of the notification is to keep property owners/managers informed of possible problems at their properties. DEO Vogel will be notified of any police calls at a certain address through the Brown County Sheriff's Office computer system and will then notify the property owner/manager. The notification will provide the type of incident, the date and time of the incident as well as a brief synopsis of the incident.

Why is it important to move to the right when approached by an emergency vehicle?

The obvious reason is to allow the vehicle to pass quickly. While the drivers of these emergency vehicles are trained to expect many reactions to our sudden presence, we hope and expect only the correct and legal reaction. This is of course, to pull to the right and stop. Both are very important to the safety of all drivers, especially the emergency drivers

The wrong decisions include:

- * Ignoring us completely and continuing down the road
- * Stopping immediately in front of us
- * Pulling to the left
- * Pulling onto mountable medians
- * Racing ahead so that we don't catch up to you
- * Pulling to the right and slowing down, but not stopping

A very common, and dangerous maneuver, is pulling to the right, but not stopping. This causes the other cars alongside of them to stay in the left lane, make futile attempts to move right, and risk everyone when they swerve back to the left rather than collide with another vehicle that they thought had pulled over and stopped.

We hope both sides of the road yield to us. Even if it is sometimes unnecessary, it allows us to have a wide margin of error if any driver, including the emergency drivers, makes an error. Having more room to pass through allows us to have more attention on our route and preparing for what we will see when we arrive at our destination. If we are unsuccessful, not only is there a very potential for injuries and damage on the road, but we will also not be able to help anyone at our destination. The delay will very likely cause more pain or damage that could easily be avoided if you allow us to delay you a mere ten seconds or so to pass by. Please make the right move and make it safer for everyone on the road.

June Police Reports

- ***June 5th: Deputy Rousseau responded to the Del Rio Apartments on the 600 block of W. Briar Ln for a theft report of a front license plate. Statement obtained from the victim with no suspects listed at this time. Report completed and license plate entered as stolen with the WI DOT.***
- ***June 20th: Deputy Rousseau responded to Resurrection Church/School at 333 Hilltop Dr. for a report of damage to property. The complainant/staff employee was reporting that unknown suspects were setting small fires behind the church/playground area. The complainant reported to Deputy Rousseau that the fires were so small that they did not need a police report completed. The church was only asking for extra patrol to be completed by deputies at this time.***
- ***June 24th: Deputy D. Fameree took a report of a theft from an unoccupied home in the 700 block of Terraview Dr. The victim reported he had 7 televisions stolen out of his house after the last tenants had moved out. No suspects at this time. Statement obtained and report completed by Deputy Fameree. Case referred to the BCSO Investigative Unit.***
- ***June 28th: Deputy Mason responded to Green Isle Park for a theft report. Village of Allouez Parks Dept. was reporting a LED light was stolen from their building next to the tennis courts. The light was stolen sometime during the weekend. Unknown suspects at this time. Incident report completed.***
- ***In the month of June deputies responded to or initiated approximately 620 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 152 traffic Stops, 35 traffic crashes, 21 disturbances, and 39 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.***

Item #1

On June 1st, Deputies P. Giesler and S. Thor responded to Bellin Psychiatric for an out of control patient. An inpatient adult male was threatening to kill himself. Deputies responded and were able to help calm down the patient. Staff advised they needed deputies then to stand by while they administered care to the patient. Deputies were then able to clear the scene after the patient was cared for.

Item #2

On June 6th, DEO J. Vogel and Deputy J. Rousseau responded to an address on the 1600 block of Patton St. for a welfare check. Multiple neighbors reported not seeing the residents at this certain address for over two weeks. It was reported the lawn was not being cut and that was not like the couple to keep the yard unkept. Deputies knocked on the door with no answer and the house was found secure. Upon investigation with other neighbors in the area it was learned the couple owns another house out of state. An address was found and the local police in that jurisdiction were contacted to perform a welfare check. This police department learned the couple was currently on vacation in Alaska at this time. A telephone number was provided and DEO Vogel was able to speak with the residents. The couple reported they believed their son-in-law was going to cut the grass.

Item #3

On June 11th, Deputies R. Wagner, J. Kazik, K. Verheyen, and Sgt. T. Johnson responded to the 500 block of Greene Ave for a report of a Male vs. Female physical disturbance. Deputies responded and all parties refused any rescue/medical response. Statement obtained from the male victim. The female suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Brown County Jail for DVO Disorderly Conduct.

Item #4

On June 14th, Deputy S. Knutson responded to an address on the 3200 block of Libal St for a report of a damaged mail box. The complainant stated she heard a child yelling earlier in the day and was concerned the child hit it while on a bicycle. Upon arrival Deputy Knutson and the complainant learned that it was her neighbors mailbox that was damaged and not hers. Deputy Knutson was able to speak with that neighbor who informed him their daughter had accidentally struck their mailbox with their car. No further police assistance needed.

Item #5

On June 21st, Deputy K. Mason was sent to the Allouez Parkside Village, located at 1901 Libal St, for a report of employee theft. Management reported to Deputy Mason a female employee was stealing medication from the residents. Statements obtained and report completed. Report was assigned to Investigative Sgt. T. Thomas. Upon his investigation, Sgt. Thomas is referring charges to the District Attorneys Office on the suspect.

Item #6

On June 21st, Deputies C. Brown, H. Estano, C. Tassoul, and A. Ebel responded to the 3900 block of East River Dr. for a report of a suicidal female. It was reported the suspect had ingested multiple pills and spoke of wanting to die. The suspect female was not at this residence upon police arrival. A ping of her phone location was obtained and the female was located in the Bellin Psychiatric parking lot. The female was transported to St. Vincent's ER for a medical clearance. Once medical clearance was obtained the female was then transported to the Crisis Center for evaluation. Statements were obtained and an incident report was completed by Deputy Brown.

Item #7

On June 24th, Deputies D. Fameree, T. Tasch, and Sgt. Pamerter responded to an address on the 1300 block of S. Van Buren St. for a disturbance. It was reported there was an out of control male at this residence who was highly intoxicated. Deputies arrived and were able to take the suspect into custody. The suspect was transported to the BCJ on charges of DVO Disorderly Conduct and Criminal Damage to Property.
