Allouez Tidbit's

-On February 19th the Brown County Drug Task Force served a drug related search warrant at an address in the 100 block of Beaupre St. As a result several people were arrested for drug related charges. Deputy Loppnow also cited the tenant as a public nuisance. Fortunately these situations don't come up very often in Allouez. In these cases Deputy Loppnow works with the drug task force to assist in their investigation and follow's up with the case by contacting the property owner/landlord and addressing the situation.

-We will be holding another prescription pill take back event on April 26th from 10am to 2pm at the Allouez Village Hall. Just like our past events and unwanted/unused prescription or over the counter medications can be dropped off for proper disposal. The only items that we cannot accept are inhalers and anything with a needle/syringe.

-We have again had several cases of fraud/phone scams recently in the Village of Allouez. Please remember to never give out your personal information to anyone over the phone. Also never send money to anyone unless you are 100% sure who you are dealing with.

Ambulance providers, such as the Green Bay Metro Fire Department, often respond to medical calls that involve a person that is unconscious or unable to speak for various reasons. This can make things difficult for medical providers as a patient's medical history often aid in treatment. The lack of a patient's medical information and medical history can cause difficulties.

Often times, family and friends on the scene are able to provide us with what we need. For those times when a patient is alone, unconscious, or unable to speak during a medical emergency, we can rely on ICE. I'm not talking about the frozen cubes that you put into your glass to keep your beverage cold. I am referring to In Case of Emergency (ICE). ICE is an emergency contact phone number for a spouse, friend, or relative that you program into your cell phone under the contact name ICE.

If emergency responders like firefighters, paramedics, EMT's, or police officers should happen to find a person unconscious or in a serious accident, they can use your cell phone to call your ICE contact to obtain essential medical information about you. Your ICE contact should be able to provide information such as; your age, medicine that you take, food and medicine allergies, and any medical conditions that you might have. You can also store more than one ICE contact in your phone by using ICE1, ICE2, ICE spouse, or ICE mom.

ICE was started in Brittan by a paramedic in 2005 and has slowly been implemented in the United States. Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) classes in our area are even telling their students to look for ICE contacts in patient's cell phones if they need to. We are urging people to put an ICE contact into their cell phone and tell at least 10 friends or family members about this excellent program.

For those that continue to resist the temptation of a cell phone and modern technology, there is still a way for you to participate in ICE! Make a card for your wallet with ICE in bold letters with a contact to call. You could also include some of your medical information and allergies if you wanted to.

- *February 2nd: Deputy Mleziva responded to a residence Memory Ct. for a theft complaint. The caller reported the theft of a package that had apparently been delivered by the U.S. Postal Service. Post Office records indicated that the package had been delivered, but the caller stated that he never received it. The caller believes that it was stolen from in-between the front doors. Report completed-no suspects at this time.*
- *February 9th: Deputies responded to several reports of broken vehicle windows that had possibly been shot out with a BB gun. The incidents occurred in the 3000 block of Ravine Dr., the 3200 block of Delahaut St., and the 3400 block of S. Clay St. No suspects at this time.*
- *February 10th: Deputy Stevens responded to the Midway Mobile for a gas drive-off. The caller reported an unknown suspect pumping gas into a vehicle with no license plates and then leaving without paying. This is believed to be the third time the same suspect has done it. Surveillance video obtained and report completed. No suspect information at this time.*
- *February 12th: Deputy Vogel responded to a residence on Bitters Ct. for a fraud complaint. The caller reported sending money to claim a prize from a party claiming to be from Publishers Clearing House. The caller never got the prize promised and was out the money sent. This is suspected to be part of a phone scam. Report completed-no suspect at this time.*
- *February 28th: Deputy Dzekute responded to an address in the 100 block of St. Francis Dr. for a fraud report. The caller reported that her debit card information was being used and fraudulent charges had been made. Report completed-no suspects at this time.*
- *In the month of February Deputies responded to or initiated approximately 603 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 210 traffic stops, 39 traffic crashes, 7 disturbances, and 19 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.*

Item #1

On February 2, Deputy Shield and other Deputies responded to a report of a vehicle that was southbound on Libal St. from Allouez Ave. The caller reported that the occupants were throwing beer bottles out the window. The vehicle was located on Libal St. near LeBrun Rd. and stopped just into DePere. After questioning, it was determined that the driver of the vehicle was sober, but four underage passengers had been drinking. The four passengers were all cited for underage drinking and underage possession of alcohol.

Item #2

On February 2, Deputy Shield conducted a traffic stop on E. Mission Rd. at Oakwood Ave. The operator of the vehicle was found to be intoxicated. The driver was arrested for probation violations and for operating while intoxicated.

Item #3

On February 6, Deputy Mleziva responded to Webster Ave at McCormick St. for a two car accident. Upon arrival one of the drivers involved was found to be under the influence. That driver was arrested for operating while under the influence.

Item #4

On February 15, Deputy Verheyen and other Deputies responded to a residence in the 800 block of E. Briar Ln. for a disturbance between a male and female. Upon interviewing those involved the male was arrested for disorderly conduct, damage to property, and battery.

Item #5

On February 16, Deputy Lemberger and other Deputies responded to Bellin Hospital for a male party that was apparently stabbed at St. Michaels Pub. After interviewing several people who were involved, Deputies learned that the victim and suspect knew each other and had gotten into a fight in the parking lot. During the fight the victim was stabbed. The suspect, who was also at the hospital, was arrested for first degree recklessly endangering safety.

Item #6

On February 19, Deputy Vogel responded to Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft complaint. Store employees had stopped a female party after observing her take several items. The female was cooperative and cited for retail theft.

Item #7

On February 20, Deputy Shield and other Deputies responded to an address in the 2400 block of Libal Street to attempt to locate a male party who had an outstanding probation and parole warrant. The male was located, taken into custody, and transported to jail.

Item #8

On February 19, Deputy Loppnow assisted the Brown County Drug Task Force with the service of a search warrant at a residence in the 100 block of Beaupre St. Three individuals were arrested by the Drug Task Force for numerous drug charges. Deputy Loppnow also cited one of the individuals (tenant) for maintaining a public nuisance.

Item #9

On February 25, Deputy Mueller responded to Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft complaint. Store employees had stopped a male who was observed attempting to steal items. The male was cited for retail theft and then released.

Item #10

On February 26, Deputy Shield stopped a vehicle on Hoffman Rd. near East River Dr. for a traffic violation. Upon contacting the occupants of the vehicle it was found that a underage passenger in the vehicle had been drinking. The passenger was cited for underage drinking.

Item #11

On February 27, a County Rescue Service Ambulance reported following a reckless driver on Allouez Ave and then onto Webster Ave. Ambulance personnel reported the vehicle swerving and hitting curbs. Deputy Shield caught up and stopped the vehicle on Webster Ave. The operator was found to be intoxicated and arrested for OWI.
