May 2014 Allouez Tidbits

-We are currently preparing for the 38th annual Bellin Run. Close to 20,000 people are expected to participate in this year's event. The Brown County Sheriff's Office, Green Bay Police Dept., Green Bay Metro Fire Dept., Allouez Street Dept., Brown County Hwy Dept., Green Bay Street Dept., and Bellin officials have been meeting and planning the course set-up and emergency plans. The run will be held on June 14th starting at approximately 8a.m. At about 7:45a.m. until about 12p.m. the course route, which is mostly in Allouez, will be shut down and no vehicles/traffic will be allowed. - Recently the Village has received several complaints about dogs being off-leash in parks/trails and also owners not cleaning up after their dogs. In order to enhance everyone's experience in the Allouez parks or on the trails please be considerate of the Allouez ordinances regarding animals. Per Allouez ordinance 6.06 dogs must be on a leash no longer 6 feet in length. Additionally anyone walking a dog off the owner's property must have equipment to clean up any defecation by the animal. Those caught violating the ordinance could face a fine starting at \$187.

-Recently questions have come up regarding registered sex offenders and when residents are notified that a registered sex offender is moving in. Notifications are not made in every instance of a registered sex offender moving. The public can always look up registered sex offenders in their area at www.widocoffenders.org On this website the public can also sign up for notifications when a registered sex offender moves into a specific area. This website is an excellent resource for frequently asked questions regarding sex offenders.

Green Bay Metro Fire Department-Allouez Station

Riding a bicycle is enjoyed by many people. Some ride for fun and exercise and others are riding to save on fuel costs. Unfortunately, the Green Bay Metro Fire Department responds to many bicycle accidents every year.

In 2010, 515,000 people in the U.S. were treated for bicycle-related injuries and more than 800 died due to those injuries as reported by the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control. Children 14 and under are five times more likely to be injured on a bicycle than older riders.

Here are some tips to help keep yourself and your family safe when bicycling:

- * Wear a helmet. You are 14 times more likely to die in a crash if not wearing a helmet!
- * Wear bright colored and reflective clothing so that you are easily visible to other motorists.
- * Do not ride on the sidewalk. When you come off of the sidewalk to cross the street, you are invisible to turning motorists.
 - * Ride with traffic not against it. How are you going to make a right turn? 25% of bicycling collisions are a result of riding the wrong way.
- * Stay at least 3 feet away from the curb. If you ride too close to the curb you are more likely to be out of motorists' field of view. Legally you have a right a whole lane.
- * Give 3ft. of space between you and parked cars. A door could open at any moment.
 - * Use bike lanes when possible.
 - * Use a headlight and taillight when riding at night.
 - * Use the proper hand signals.

Bicyclists are small and often hard to see on the road, as motorists are used to sharing the road with other cars. Taking the proper steps to be seen and always wearing a helmet will help keep you and your family safe on two wheels this summer.

- *April 1st: Deputy VonHaden responded to a residence in the 800 block of East Briar Ln. for a fraud complaint. The caller reported receiving information from the IRS regarding his tax return which had been filed. The complainant stated that he had not filed his tax return yet. The complainant believed that his social security number may have been used by someone in error and was taking steps to get the situation resolved. Report completed and sent to the Investigative Division.*
- *April 9th: Deputy Vogel responded to an address on McCormick St for a fraud report. The complainant reported a phone call from a company called "Advance Tech Support". The person stated that they mistakenly billed the complainant's credit card for \$350 and needed the complainant's card/bank account information to refund the money. The complainant gave the person the requested information and later found that \$350 had been taken out of her bank account. This phone call was a scam to obtain the complainant's account information. Report completed and sent to the Investigative Division.*
- *April 28th: Deputy Mleziva responded to the Broadview YMCA for a theft complaint. The caller reported a sweater stolen from the locker room. No suspects at this time.*
- *In the month of April Deputies responded to or initiated approximately 583 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 173 traffic stops, 21 traffic crashes, 13 disturbances, and 26 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.*

Item #1

On April 5, Deputy Vogel responded to Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft complaint. The store manager reported a female taking a greeting card without paying and then leaving. The manager was able to get the license plate of the vehicle the suspect left in. Deputy Vogel was able to contact the suspect and she was cited for retail theft.

Item #2

On April 13, Deputy Shield conducted a traffic stop on Riverside Dr. near W. St. Joseph St. The operator of the vehicle was found to be intoxicated and arrested for OWI.

Item #3

On April 23, Deputy Vogel responded to Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft. A male party had been observed taking meat without paying and was being detained by employees. The male was cited for retail theft. The male was also found to be on probation and probation agents requested he be arrested for a probation violation. The male was transported to jail.

Item #4

On April 26, Deputy VerHeyen and other Deputies responded to a residence in the 2200 block of Libal St. for a report of a disturbance. Deputies made contact with a male and female who stated that they were just arguing. The female was arrested for outstanding warrants from the Allouez Municipal Court.

Item #5

On April 29, Deputy Mleziva and other Deputies responded to a residence on Taft St. for a disturbance between a male and female. After speaking with the parties involved the male was issued a citation for disorderly conduct. The male also agreed to leave the residence.

Item #6

On April 30, Deputy Mleziva and Deputy Loppnow responded to the Webster Avenue Market for a retail theft complaint. Store managers had detained two females who attempted to leave the store without paying for numerous items that they put in their baby strollers(which also had children in them). Both females were issued citations for retail theft and released.
