## Allouez Halloween Trick-or-Treat Hours Monday Oct. 31 4pm-7pm



This year's trick-or-treat hours in the Village of Allouez are Monday Oct. 31 from 4pm-7pm. Trick-or-Treating can be a fun time for kids and adults. Here are some safety tips to keep everyone safe.

- Have your children trick-or-treat in groups and make sure a trusted adult is supervising them.
- Avoid areas you or your children are not familiar with.
- Don't approach homes that do not have a porch light on. Homes without lights on typically are not giving out treats.
- Make sure your child knows never to enter a residence unless you are with them.
- Teach your children never to approach vehicles or strangers.
- Have a pre-arranged meet location set up in the event that you and your child are separated.
- Have children wear reflective costumes and/or carry flashlights so they can be easily seen during hours of darkness.



## **Green Bay Metro Fire Department-Allouez Station**

October 9th-15th is Fire Prevention Week. The theme for this year is “Don’t Wait – Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years.” Three out of five fire deaths occur in homes that do not have a working alarm. Every home should have one on every level (at the bare minimum). We recommend that they be placed outside and inside of every bedroom as well.

This year’s Fire Prevention Week campaign, “Don’t Wait – Check the Date! Replace Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years,” represents the final year of our three-year effort to educate the public about basic but essential elements of smoke alarm safety.

Why focus on smoke alarms three years in a row? Because National Fire Protection Association’s (NFPA) survey data shows that the public has many misconceptions about smoke alarms, which may put them at increased risk in the event of a home fire. For example, only a small percentage of people know how old their smoke alarms are, or how often they need to be replaced. Read more from NFPA Journal.

As a result of those and related findings, we’re addressing smoke alarm replacement this year with a focus on these key messages:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Make sure you know how old all the smoke alarms are in your home.
- To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm; the alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date.

- ***September 10th:*** Deputy Brown responded to an address in the 600 block of W. Briar Ln for a criminal damage to property report. The victim reported seeing a female running away from her car in the parking lot at this location. Victim then reported seeing scratches to her vehicle. Possible suspects listed for this incident. Follow up on going at this time.
- ***September 11<sup>th</sup>:*** Deputy J. Sanford responded to the 1300<sup>th</sup> block of Hastings St for a report of a possible hit and run. The victim reported finding damage to her legally parked vehicle on the street. Unknown suspect at this time. Accident report completed.
- ***September 16th:*** Deputy J. Rusk responded to the Bellin Health Center at 1920 S. Webster Ave for a report of a suspicious person. The complainant stated an unknown suspect drove up to his vehicle and took a picture of the vin number. Incident documented and extra patrol requested in area.
- ***September 27th:*** Deputy J. Rousseau responded to a residence in the 100 block of Helene Rd. for a fraud complaint. The caller reported that she was scammed on her computer. It was reported an unknown suspect had gotten access into her phone through her computer. Report completed and sent to the Brown County Investigative Unit.
- ***September 29th:*** Deputy S. Knutson responded to an address in the 200 block of St. Matthews St. for a fraud complaint. The victim reported being scammed out of a large amount of money while online. The victim was told to buy a large amount of iTunes to solve a hacking issue on his computer. Report completed and sent to the BC Investigative Unit.
- ***In the month of September Deputies responded to or initiated approximately 536 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 117 Traffic Stops, 26 traffic crashes, 17 disturbances, 20 welfare checks, and 40 suspicious person/vehicle/situation calls.***

### **Item #1**

On September 3<sup>rd</sup>, Deputy Rousseau was dispatched to the Green Bay Correctional Institution (GBCI) for a visitor attempting to smuggle in contraband into the prison. GBCI completed a report and Deputy Rousseau placed the contraband into the evidence room at the Brown County Sheriff's Office.

### **Item #2**

On September 5<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 12:00am, Deputy R. Wagner was traveling on Riverside Dr near STH 172 when a vehicle passed him failing to dim the vehicles high beam headlights. Upon further observation of the vehicle in question, Deputy Wagner observed the vehicles tail lamp was cracked and showing white. Deputy Wagner performed a traffic stop on STH 172 at Riverside Dr due to this vehicle having these traffic violations. Deputy Wagner observed clues that the operator was intoxicated. After further investigation the operator was taken into custody for OWI 1<sup>st</sup> offense and was also cited for Approaching Operator failing to dim high beam headlights.

### **Item #3**

On September 6<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 2:35pm, Deputy Mason performed a traffic stop on a vehicle for a vehicle having a defective left outside mirror. While speaking with the operator Deputy Mason smelled a strong odor of marijuana coming from the vehicle. The vehicle was searched at this time. Drug paraphernalia and illegal prescription pills were located. Charges are being forwarded to the Brown County District Attorney's Office.

**Item #4**

On September 11<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 1:00am, Deputy N. Delebreau, while working under the state funded OWI Task Force enforcement, performed a traffic stop on Riverside Dr at Allouez Ave for a vehicle speeding. Deputy Delebreau observed clues that the operator had been drinking. Field sobriety tests were performed on the operator. The operator was taken into custody for OWI 2<sup>nd</sup>.

**Item #5**

On September 13th, Deputy Brown performed a traffic stop on Kalb at Rustic Oak Ct. The operator was found to have a suspended driver's license at this time. While speaking with the operator Deputy Brown could smell a strong odor of intoxicants coming from the vehicle. The operator performed field sobriety tests and was then taken into custody for OWI 1<sup>st</sup>.

**Item #6**

On September 17th, at approx. 1:45am, Deputy Wagner and multiple Brown County Deputies responded to a residence on the 1300 block of Van Buren St for report of a suspicious situation. The victim feared someone was inside her apartment and could hear loud noises from inside. Deputies responded and were able to take a confused male into custody that had been seen inside the upper apartment. The male was transported to the Brown County Jail on charges of Criminal Damage to Property, Criminal Trespass of Dwelling, Disorderly Conduct, and a Probation Hold.

**Item #6**

On September 23<sup>rd</sup>, at approx. 7:00am, Deputy Resch was sent to Hawthorn Suites at 335 W St. Joseph St for a report of a suspicious vehicle near their location. The complainant believed a red vehicle was possibly stolen and heard on the news that police were looking for it. Deputies responded and learned the vehicle was indeed stolen from the City of Green Bay. GBPD officers responded and towed the vehicle away.
