### **WHAT CAN BE DROPPED OFF?**

Prescription medicines (pills, capsules, ointments, lotions, and or patches); Over the counter medicines (pills, capsules, ointments, vitamins); Sample medications; Liquid medicine in glass or leak proof containers; and Inhalers.

### **What is NOT Collected:**

Thermometers; Hydrogen Peroxide and Isopropyl alcohol; Sharps, syringes, and/or lancets; Biological waste; Institutional health care waste; Aerosols other than inhalers; Medical wastage to include used or unused IV tubes, dressings, bandages, Band-Aids and cold packs; Personal care products like nail polish, non-prescription shampoos, lotion, Vaseline, chapstick, and cosmetics.

### Heating Safety

Every year in the US, heating equipment related fires kill over 500 people, injure nearly 1500, and cause more than \$900 million in property damages. Have you properly prepared your furnace and your home for a safe heating season?

Here are the things that you should do to get ready;

- Have your furnace inspected by a licensed technician annually. He or she will make sure that your furnace is running efficiently and check it out for damage and leaks which could lead to carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.
- Have your fireplace chimney inspected on a yearly basis. Soot buildup can easily cause a chimney fire.
- Carbon Monoxide is a silent killer. Place a CO detector in your home to warn you of a heating appliance malfunction.
- Ensure that you have a working smoke detector on each level of your home.
- Your family should have and practice a fire escape plan.
- Maintain a three foot clearance between all heating equipment and anything that can burn.

Of the more than 60,000 heating equipment fires that occur every year in the US, the main causes were;

- Combustibles placed too close to heating equipment.
- Lack of maintenance of the heating appliance or chimney.

As the temperature drops, the number of fires caused by heating equipment rises. Heating equipment is the number one cause of fires during December, January, and February. Remember that almost ALL fires are preventable. Take the necessary steps to safeguard your family during this heating season.

## **SEPTEMBER POLICE INCIDENTS**

**\*ALERT\* \*ALERT\* \*ALERT\* \*ALERT\* \*ALERT\***

**In the month of September, Brown County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to or initiated approximately 607 police calls in the Village of Allouez. This included approximately 171 Traffic Stops, 37 Welfare Checks, 29 Animal Calls, 28 Accidents, and 18 Disturbance Calls. The following is a brief synopsis of some of those calls.**

- ***Sept 5<sup>th</sup>: At approx. 9:00am, the Green Bay Metro Fire/Rescue Department and Deputy J. Rusk were dispatched to an address on the 100 block of Fairview Ave, for a report of a CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR going off and a resident feeling ill. The residents waited in the driveway while Rescue cleared the house. This is a great reminder to check your Carbon Monoxide and Fire Detectors at least once a year.***
- ***Sept 11<sup>th</sup>: Deputy C. Walker was dispatched to an address on the 300 block of W. Miramar Dr. for a report of theft from an automobile. The victim reported leaving his work truck unlocked and parked in his driveway last night. Multiple work tools were stolen from the vehicle. Incident report completed.***
- ***Sept 11<sup>th</sup>: Deputy Walker also was dispatched to another nearby address on the 2300 block of Du Charme Ln for a theft from automobile. The victim reported having prescription medication stolen out of his unlocked vehicle parked in his driveway last night. Incident report completed. Unknown suspects at this time for both incidents.***
- ***Sept 15<sup>th</sup>: Deputy R. Binsfeld was dispatched to an address on the 500 block of Hilltop Dr for a report of fraud. The victim reported she works for Norwex and was in contact with a suspect attempting to purchase some products. This suspect sent our victim a substantial check in the mail. When attempting to cash the check, the bank informed our victim the check was fake. The tracking label that came with the check states the return label is from Torrance, CA. Victim statement obtained and incident report completed.***
- ***Sept 23<sup>rd</sup>: Deputy Binsfeld was dispatched to the 500 block of St Marys Blvd for a report of theft. The victim was reporting prescription medication and other items were stolen from the house. The victim listed an ex-roommate/girlfriend as a suspect. Statement obtained from the victim and report completed. Unknown location of the suspect at this time.***
- ***Sept 28<sup>th</sup>: Deputy Walters was dispatched to the Wells Fargo Bank located at 1900 Libal St. for a fraudulent check. The bank was reporting an unknown suspect had cashed a fraudulent check at this location and other locations in the area. Deputy Walter obtained a statement from the manager and a made a request for video footage of the suspect. An incident report was completed and forwarded to Investigative Sgt. R. Aronstein for follow up investigation.***

### **Item #1**

**Sept 3<sup>rd</sup>, at approx. 3:00AM, Lt. J. McAuly observed a pickup truck traveling northbound on Riverside Dr at STH 172 that was swerving back and forth on the roadway. A traffic stop was performed. Deputy J. Baudry responded to assist. The male operator agreed to complete Standard Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs) to determine if it was safe for him to be driving. The male failed SFST's and was taken into custody for 1<sup>st</sup> Offense OWI. The male was later transported to the Brown County Jail where he was later released to a responsible party.**

**Item #2**

Sept 3<sup>rd</sup>, at approx. 6:00AM, Deputy Rusk and Sgt. Lau were dispatched to Allouez Sunrise Senior Care located at 279 E St. Joseph St. for an 88 year old resident that was found with no pulse and not breathing. Deputy Rusk responded with Green Bay Metro Fire/Rescue and contained the scene. The resident had a Do Not Resuscitate (DNR) Order in place. The Brown County Medical Examiner was contacted and responded to the scene. The incident was found not suspicious in nature. Incident report completed by Deputy Rusk.

**Item #3**

Sept 4<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 10:00PM, Deputies C. Brown, A. Lemberger, Deputy N. Stueber were dispatched to an address on the 200 block of Coolidge St for a report of a Male/Female physical disturbance. Deputies responded with the female suspect already leaving the scene. The male was observed with small cuts to his face. The male provided a written statement on the disturbance. It is believed the female fled to another county. Charges are being referred to the Brown County District Attorney's Office for DVO Battery and Disorderly Conduct on the female suspect.

**Item #4**

Sept 9<sup>th</sup>, at 3:00AM, Deputies C. Tassoul and K. Verheyen were dispatched to a verbal disturbance at an address on the 2700 block of S Van Buren St. According to the complainant, there were approximately 15 people outside this address with multiple vehicles. The subjects were possibly intoxicated and there was loud music playing. Contact was made with 3 individuals that lived at this address. The party was shut down and Deputy Tassoul issued and explained Noise/Disturbance citations to the 3 individuals living at this address. DEO Vogel later mailed a Nuisance Property Notification letter to the home owner explaining any further nuisance calls to this address would result in citations being issued for maintaining a nuisance property.

**Item #5**

Sept 14<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 6:00PM, Deputy Z. Walters performed a traffic stop on Libal St. for the operator not wearing a seat belt. The operator was found to have his driver's license currently suspended. A consent search was later obtained from owner/operator to search the vehicle. A small black loaded hand gun was located in the glove box. The operator was taken into custody and transported to the Brown County Jail on the charge of Carrying a Concealed Weapon. The operator was also issued and explained traffic citations for failure to fasten seatbelt, operating after suspension, and for operating a motor vehicle without insurance.

**Item #6**

Sept 16<sup>th</sup>, at approx 9:20PM., Deputy N. Winistorfer and Deputy Tassoul were dispatched to the area of S. Webster Ave and Allouez Ave, for a Reckless Driving incident. The complainant reported she witnessed a male operating a motorcycle at this intersection that had just tipped his motorcycle over and lost his female passenger. Dispatch advised the male was stumbling around trying to get his motorcycle back up-right. Dispatch advised the complainant believed the male was highly intoxicated as he was staggering around. Deputy Winistorfer responded to the area and observed a male operating a motorcycle traveling southbound on Riverside Dr. A traffic stop was performed on Broadway St near Fulton St in the City of De Pere. It was verified the female in question was ok and left the earlier accident scene in her own vehicle. Deputy Winistorfer detected an odor of intoxicants coming from the operator of the motorcycle. The operator was asked and agreed to performing SFST's. The operator failed and was taken into custody for 1<sup>st</sup> Offense OWI.

**Item #7**

Sept 18th, at approx. 3:00AM, Deputy Deputy C. Brown and multiple deputies were dispatched to an address in the 3000 block of S. Webster Ave for a report of two unknown people arguing in their backyard. The area was searched and two males were witnessed running from the area. After brief cases the juvenile males were caught and detained. The juvenile males reported running from police because it was past curfew. Record checks were performed and it was learned one of the subjects was reported as a

runaway from the Appleton area. The juvenile male was later transported to the county line and turned over to the Appleton Police Department. Municipal citations were issued to both subjects for violating curfew, prowling, and obstructing an officer.

**Item#8**

Sept 24<sup>th</sup>, at approx. 3:30PM, Deputy A. Wysocki was requested by Green Bay Police Officers Oberle and Vanderbunt to assist them with attempting to locate a suspect of theirs from a disturbance earlier in the day. They had information the suspect was believed to be located at an address on the 300 block of Bryan St. The suspect was located in the backyard with the home owner at this address. While speaking with the individuals in the backyard, the smell of marijuana was detected and green stems observed in the ash tray. The subjects admitted to smoking marijuana earlier. Deputy Wysocki asked the home owner for consent to search her residence and her property for drugs and drug paraphernalia. The home owner refused. Deputy Wysocki advised the home owner that she was now being detained and that he would be applying for a search warrant. A search warrant was drafted and later signed by Judge Zuidmulder. The search warrant was executed and the residence was secured. During the search there were items of drug paraphernalia observed. Evidence of a marijuana grow was also observed in the basement and the equipment used for growing marijuana. The Drug Task Force Unit was dispatched to the scene and collected all evidence. Charges for Manufacture / Deliver THC (5-20 plants), Keeper of a Drug House, Possession of THC, and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia are being referred to the Brown County District Attorney's Office on the home owner. The suspect for GBPD is having charges for Manufacture / Deliver THC (5-20 plants), Possession of THC, and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia being referred to the Brown County District Attorney's Office.
