****Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons****

Safety issue

It is often difficult for pedestrians to cross roads with high traffic volumes, especially roads with higher vehicle speeds. Sometimes regular traffic signals cannot be used because of spacing requirements between signals or the amount of pedestrian or side-street traffic is not high enough to justify a signal.

Safety design

A pedestrian hybrid beacon is used to warn and control traffic at a mid-block crosswalk without other traffic signals. While slightly different in appearance, this beacon functions much like a conventional pedestrian signal in that it stops traffic to allow pedestrians to cross safely.

The beacon stops traffic with a double red indication thereby creating a gap for pedestrians to cross.

Benefits

- The alternating red signal indication allows vehicles to proceed once the pedestrian has cleared their side of the travel lane, thus improving vehicle traffic flow.
- According to Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) pedestrian hybrid beacons can reduce delays for pedestrians by up to 50 percent when compared to traditional signalized crossings.
- Where are they being used?
- Pedestrian hybrid beacons should only be used with a marked crosswalk.
- These beacons are used if gaps in traffic are not adequate to permit pedestrians to cross safely.
- Transit and school locations may be good places to use the pedestrian hybrid beacon.

Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon: Steps for Activation

When there is no pedestrian waiting to cross, drivers will see that all indication lights are dark; the pedestrian will see a "DON'T WALK" symbol. A pedestrian who wants to cross the street will need to push the button to activate the system.

When a pedestrian pushes the button, approaching drivers will see a **FLASHING YELLOW** light for a few seconds, indicating that they should reduce speed and be prepared to stop for a pedestrian in the crosswalk. Pedestrians will continue to see a "DON'T WALK" symbol and should wait.

Drivers will see a **STEADY YELLOW** light, warning drivers the indication will soon turn to a **STEADY RED** light. Pedestrians will continue to see the "DON'T WALK" symbol and should continue to wait.

Drivers will see a **STEADY RED** light, which requires them to **STOP** at the stop line. At this point, the pedestrian receives a "WALK" symbol to cross.

As the pedestrian crosses the street, drivers will see **ALTERNATING FLASHING RED** lights, indicating that they need to stop. During this period, motorists are required to **STOP** or remain stopped until pedestrians have finished crossing the street. They may proceed with caution if the crosswalk is clear. Pedestrians will see a flashing countdown that indicates how much time they have to cross the street.

At the end of the flashing countdown, drivers will see that all indication lights are dark; the pedestrian will see a "DON'T WALK" symbol. Drivers may continue to proceed through the crosswalk if it is clear; pedestrians waiting to cross will have to push the button to activate the system.

Pedestrian hybrid beacon operation

- The beacon is DARK for **motorists** UNTIL **pedestrians/bicyclists** push the button to activate it AND **pedestrians/bicyclists** approaching the crosswalk see a steady "Don't Walk" indication.
- When **pedestrians/bicyclists** press the button:
 - Motorists** will see a FLASHING YELLOW indication for a few seconds, signaling that the beacon has been activated and motorists must proceed with caution.
 - Pedestrians/bicyclists** will continue to see a "Don't Walk" indication and must wait. If the beacon was recently activated, it might take up to one minute for the "Walk" indication to come up.
- The flashing yellow is followed by a SOLID YELLOW indication.
 - Motorists** should stop if able to safely do so.
 - Pedestrians/bicyclists** will continue to see a "Don't Walk" indication and must continue to wait.
- The solid yellow is followed by double SOLID RED indications.
 - Motorists** are required to come to a full STOP if they have not done so already.
 - Pedestrians/bicyclists** receive a "WALK" indication and, if clear, begins crossing the road in the marked crosswalk.
- The double solid red is followed by alternating FLASHING RED indications (the last configuration in the sequence).
 - Motorists** are required to STOP, or remain stopped, until pedestrians/bicyclists have finished crossing the street. They may proceed with caution after stopping once the crosswalk is clear of pedestrians/bicyclists.
 - Pedestrians/bicyclists** already in the crosswalk continue crossing and will receive a numerical indication counting down the time remaining to finish crossing the street.
 - Newly approaching pedestrians/bicyclists** may NOT start to cross on a flashing "Don't Walk" indication, even if they think they have enough time to clear – they must push the button and wait for the next "WALK" indication.
- The beacon will then go DARK again until activated by another pedestrian/bicyclist.
 - Motorists** may proceed through the crosswalk if it is clear.
 - Pedestrians/bicyclists** see a steady "Don't Walk" indication.



MAY-JUNE POLICE INCIDENTS

The following is a brief synopsis of some of the calls the Brown County Sheriff's Office responded to in the Village of Allouez.

- ***May 2nd***: Deputy Rusk was contacted via phone by Village of Allouez Code Enforcer Mike Lauder. Code Officer Lauder explained he was at an address on the 500 block of Hilltop Dr. to speak to an individual there and when he arrived he observed a van in front of the house with the driver door hanging wide open. The keys to the house were in the door to the house but nobody was coming to the door. He advised that he felt this was odd. Deputy Rusk responded and observed a red mini-van in the driveway with the driver door hanging wide open. Code Officer Lauder advised he had been there quite a while but nobody has come outside. Deputy Rusk asked dispatch to run the license plate and the dispatcher advised that the registration came back to the home owner at this residence. Deputy Rusk also observed the keys sitting in the door of the house. Deputy Rusk attempted to knock several times loudly but nobody came to the door. It did not appear anyone was in the house, and curtains were covering all of the windows. Dispatch located a phone number for the home owner. Deputy Rusk called the number and the owner answered. A few seconds later he came outside and met Code Officer Lauder and Deputy Rusk outside the residence. The home owner advised he was doing fine and that he was just carrying things into the house from the vehicle. He also advised he was trying to do several things all at once.
- ***May 5th, at approx. 8:00am***, Deputy Coffey was dispatched to an address Arrowhead Dr. for a report of a Suspicious Situation. Notes indicated that complainant received a suspicious letter in the mail in regards to her yard. The victim showed Deputy Coffey a letter that she received in the mail yesterday, May 4th, 2018. The letter stated, "Please don't spread the new mulch under all the old over grown unattractive bushes you have lining the front of your yard. Pull them out, long overdue. We are done looking at them. Not attractive, over grown and time to go. Walked by them for years and they just keep getting worse. This neighbor prides itself in nicely landscaped yards". The letter was addressed to "residents" and then Joan's address followed. Joan has no idea who sent the letter. The victim wanted to make deputies aware in case something happens in the future to her shrubs or she continues to get harassing letters. Deputy Coffey took pictures of the letter, envelope and the victim's yard.
- ***May 6th, at approx. 12:30pm***, Deputy Coffey was dispatched to Schroeder Flowers, located at 1530 S Webster Ave for a damage complainant. Notes indicated that the complainants back window on their vehicle was smashed. Notes stated this vehicle was located in the over flow parking lot for Schroeder Flowers employees. Deputy Coffey arrived and spoke to the victim. The victim reported at approximately 12:00 PM, he came out to his vehicle and observed that his back window was all shattered. The victim last observed his vehicle in good condition at approximately 10:00 PM on Saturday, May 5th, 2018. The victim was not sure if the damage was intentional or was natural. Note there was heavy rain during the evening/early morning hours and the victim's vehicle is not in the greatest condition. The rear hatch is rusted and cracked in several spots. The victim stated that he had his phone cord and change in the vehicle and nothing was touched or stolen, noting that the vehicle did not even appear to have been gone through. Deputy Coffey did not observe anything on scene that might have damaged the window. The victim reported that he does not have issues with anyone and asked if he found out that this was intentional at a later

time, if he could give a statement then. Deputy Coffey informed the victim that he can contact the Brown County Sheriff's Office if that issue would arise and a report could be completed.

- May 12th, at approx. 1:00am, Deputy Winistorfer and Deputy C. Brown were dispatched to the area of Titledown Manufacturing, located at 1252 Marine St, for a report of a suspicious situation. Dispatch advised there was approximately five cars parked near the call address with approximately 7-10 people standing around the cars with a strong smell of marijuana in the area. While enroute to the call Deputy Brown observed a male subject in dark clothing walking south in the north bound lanes of Riverside Drive in the area of St. Michaels Pub. Deputy Winistorfer and Deputy Brown arrived on scene and observed several vehicles parked in the restaurant to the south of Jimmy Seas without any people around. The complainant was still in the area and stated he saw a couple of vehicles leave but he did not see anybody leave on foot. Deputy Winistorfer checked the Fox River Trail for any individuals that may have left the area on foot down the trail. Deputy Brown went back and attempt to make contact with the male he observed walking on Riverside Drive when responding to the area. Deputy Brown located the male still walking on Riverside Drive by St. Joseph St. Deputy Brown asked the male what he was up to and he stated he was just walking. Deputy Brown asked the male where he was coming from and he did not answer. The male was looking straight towards Deputy Brown with a 1000 yard stare. Deputy Brown asked him a couple of more times where he was coming from and where he was going and he continued to not answer. At this time it appeared as if the male was under the influence of some sort of drug. Due to his unusual behavior. Deputy Brown decided to detain him for officer safety reasons and placed him in handcuffs. Deputy Brown continued to ask him questions like if he had taken any drugs, what his name was and where he lived and he would not answer me. The male eventually reported his first name. When asked for his last name he again didn't answer. A fast ID was attempted on the male with negative results. The male eventually reported his address in the City of Green Bay. Deputies were eventually able to identify the male but would answer my questions with a long delay and would speak real slowly and quietly. Deputies transported the male to the address he to see if contact could be made with anyone there. At that address deputies made contact with the father. Deputy Brown questioned the father if the suspect had any issues with drugs and he stated not that he knows of but stated the suspect has been having some mental health issues lately. Deputies asked the suspect earlier if he wanted to hurt himself and he stated no. The father stated he was willing to look over the suspect for the remainder of the night.*
- May 13th, at approx. 8:00am, Deputy Coffey was dispatched to an address on the 700 Broadview Dr., for a damage complainant. Notes indicated that the complainant's car was egged last night. Upon arrival Deputy Coffey spoke to the complainant who reported that his car was parked on the road outside of his residence and was egged last night. The Victim stated that he last saw his car Saturday night, at approximately 10:00 PM, and at that time his car was not egged. Victim stated that recently his house was egged also. The victim provided a name as a possible suspect. The victim reports that his neighbor has noticed a red in color car that drives through the area with their lights off during the late hours of the night. Unknown plate or driver. The victim did not have damage to his car. The victim stated that he will be putting cameras up and will hopefully catch the individual that keeps egging his families property. Pictures taken and attached to incident.*
- May 15th, 2018 at approximately 10:00am, Sergeant M. Bultman and Deputy Coffey were dispatched to the Woodlawn Cemetery, 1542 S Webster Ave, for a*

report of a disturbance. Notes indicated that an 11 year old was out of control, kicking and hitting his teacher. Upon arrival Deputies spoke to with the juvenile and his teacher. The teacher advised Deputies that the juvenile is Autistic and that they were there on a school field trip from Fort Howard School. The juvenile was calmed down and the school principal arrived to transport him back to school. The principal advised that they would make contact with a parent in regards to the incident today. No criminal charges.

- *May 31st, at approx. 12:30pm, Deputy Coffey was dispatched to the 3600 block of Fernwood Ave for a report of a Burglary. The victims reported an unknown person must have entered their home and stole \$500 in cash. Statements obtained from male and female victims. No damage was observed to any of the door entries. The victims provided two suspect names that may have access to the home. Report completed with follow up needed.*
- *June 6th, at approx. 7:00pm, Deputy Ebel was dispatched to an address on the 3700 block of Libal St for a possible scam. Deputy Ebel arrived with the complainant reporting he received a phone call from somebody claiming to be with the government. The complainant stated he does a lot of "business" overseas with a friend who is staying in Ghana. Two days ago, the complainant wired \$1000 to this friend using Western Union but received a phone call from Western Union later stating the transaction had been cancelled because it was flagged as a possible scam. Now, today, the complainant received a phone call from 2 individuals, Stella Lee and Adam White, claiming to be with the government. Stella and Adam at no time asked for any of the complainants information, but knew about his recent wire to his friend in Ghana and how it had been cancelled. Stella and Adam stated they believe the friend is involved in a large scam ring. The complainant stated Stella and Adam knew a lot of information about him including his driver's license number. Stella and Adam did not ask for anything financially or personally. The complainant called Western Union to see if they had given his information out to anybody. Western Union denied the accusations. The complainant took necessary precautions and called the credit bureau and his bank to watch for fraudulent activity. At this time, the complainant has not lost anything financially and nobody is using his identity fraudulently. Deputy Ebel instructed to call back if anything fraudulent occurs.*
- *June 5th, at approx. 10:30pm Deputy Tasch and Deputy Mleziva responded to the area of the 1000 block of Hastings St. for a suspicious male. The complainant wanted to report a suspicious male that was in their backyard the last two nights. Deputies arrived with the complainant reporting he ran after the male suspect tonight but the male got away. The suspect ran eastbound on Hastings St until he cut in between houses running south. The complainant said on 6/4/18 at approx. 10PM his dog was growling at something outside so he took the dog outside. He went to the backyard where he saw a male possibly crawling but then took off running once seen. He couldn't get a description. Now on 6/5/18 at approx. 10:30PM the dog was growling again and the complainant remembered he left his garage open. He said he went outside to see the motion light in his garage was illuminated which meant someone most likely entered it. He walked to the side of the garage and there was a male standing there. He shined the flashlight on the male and the male took off running. He said the male was "black or a darker skin," was approx. 18-24 years old, approx. 5'6" with dark colored jeans, a dark colored hooded sweatshirt and a green ball cap. He had no further information. The complainant said nothing was taken from his garage and was requesting extra patrol. Officers checked the area for the male but were unable to locate anyone.*
- *June 29th: at approx. 6:30pm, Deputy J Milkie, was dispatched to and address on the 200 block of E Beaupre St, in reference to some found property. Upon arrival*

Deputy Milkie met with complainant who reported his son found a large cash bill on E Beaupre St. He then contacted police. Deputy Milkie advised he would make contact with the neighbors to see if they were missing it. Deputy Milkie spoke with several neighbors who reported not missing any money. The money was logged into property at the Brown County Sheriff's Office for safekeeping.

Item #1

May 4th @ approx. 10:30pm, Deputy J. Kazik was on patrol working for the state funded OWI Grant Enforcement patrol. A call was dispatched to multiple deputies for a reckless driver traveling eastbound on STH 172 at Webster Ave. K9 Deputy B. Dernbach was able to locate the vehicle traveling northbound on I-43 near STH 57/54. Deputy Dernbach made several observations of the suspect vehicle crossing the white dotted center line and the solid white fog line. A traffic stop was performed on STH 57/54 near Nicolet Dr. Deputy Kazik responded to this location. An odor of intoxicants was observed coming from the vehicle while speaking with the driver. The occupants admitted to drinking earlier this evening at Oneida Bingo & Casino. The operator agreed to perform SFST's for Deputy Kazik. The suspect fail SFST's and was taken into custody for OWI 1st Offense. The suspect was transported to an area hospital where a blood draw was completed. The suspect was then released to a responsible party.

Item #2

May 4th @ approx. 4:00pm, Deputy Walker and DEO Vogel were dispatched to Webster Ave Market, located at 1220 S Webster Ave, for a retail theft. Call notes stated a Female/Hispanic walked out of the store with stolen items and got into a red Chevy Impala traveling southbound on S Webster Ave. The area was searched by deputies but they were unable to come up with the suspect vehicle. The registered owner of the run vehicle came back to a Milwaukee address. A report was completed by Deputy Walker. Deputy Walker also completed a Roll Call email county wide asking for information on identifying the suspect in a picture attached. Deputy Walker was later contacted by Green Bay Police Officer D. Steffens. Officer Steffens reported being contacted by the suspect admitted to the retail theft. Deputy Walker was able to orchestrate having Officer Steffens issue the suspect a municipal ordinance citation for retail theft.

Item #3

May 13th @ approx. 9:00pm, Deputy Binsfeld was dispatched to Bellin Hospital ER for a theft report that originally occurred at Mariner Motel, located at 2222 Riverside Dr. Call notes stated the complainant was calling in that she was scared to go back to the motel because she doesn't feel safe. In addition the complainant stated her medication was possibly stolen. The victim reported on 5-4-18 her and a friend moved in together at the Mariner Motel. The victim stated since moving in the suspect has been drinking heavily and she is worried and scared of her. The victim reported she went through surgery and when returning home she found out that another person had moved in. The victim reported medication is now missing. The victim reported she does not care about the missing medication but she just wants to move out the motel. The victim was advised to contact the BCSO when she is discharged from the hospital so a keep the peace can be completed. The victim reported she is going to stay at her fiancé's house.

Item #4

May 17th @ approx. 12:00pm, Deputy Coffey and Deputy Resch were dispatched to check the area of Garland St and S Irwin Ave for a suspicious vehicle. Deputy Coffey was able to locate the vehicle and observed it leave the area. A traffic stop was performed on Webster Ave at Greene Ave. The operator stated they were in the area picking up family. While speaking with the operator, deputies could smell a strong odor of marijuana emitting from the vehicle. All 4 parties inside the vehicle were asked to step out and searched. The operator provided Deputy Coffey with a concealed carry permit and stated he did have a gun on him at this time. The gun was turned over to deputies without incident. Deputies were able to locate a green leafy substance inside a purse located inside the vehicle that later tested positive for THC. Three out of the four individuals

were issued a municipal citation for Possession of Marijuana. The gun was returned to the operator and all parties left the scene without incident.

Item #5

May 20th @ approx. 9:15am, Deputy M. Berner and Deputy Rusk were dispatched to an address on the 900 block of Catherine St for a report of a Male vs Male physical disturbance in progress. Deputies arrived and learned a suspect had left on foot walking north into the city. Deputies searched the area and were able to locate the suspect in a park. The suspect was detained. After obtaining statements were the disturbance occurred, the male suspect found in the park was transported to the Brown County Jail on charges of DVO Disorderly Conduct.

Item #6

May 25th @ approx. 12:30am, Deputy K. Verheyen was dispatched to an address on the 2500 block of Webster Ave for a report of an unknown female pounding on the door stating she was elderly and needed help. Deputies arrived and were able to locate the female. The female was historical and appeared very intoxicated. After approx. 15 minutes of trying to calm the female down to obtain a story of what occurred, deputies learned the female was traveling with her husband from Chicago, IL. The couple was on their way to Suring, WI to visit relatives. The female reported her husband and her got into an argument somewhere on I-43. The female stated she called 911 on her cell phone but the husband grabbed it and threw it out the window. The argument continued resulting in the husband dropping this female off at this location and leaving the area. An ATL was sent out to attempt to locate the suspect vehicle. The female reported all she wanted to do was go to a hotel and fall asleep. Deputies contacted other counties for a 911 Hang Up call to find where this disturbance occurred. No counties reported having 911 Hang Ups on I-43. With permission from the female, deputies attempted to ping her phone with negative results. The female was later transported to an area hotel. An informational report was completed by Deputy Verheyen at this time.

Item #7

May 26th @ approx. 4:00pm, Deputy N. Dennis performed a traffic stop in the parking lot next to McDonalds on Webster Ave. While speaking with the operator a strong odor of marijuana was observed coming from the vehicle. The operator was found to have a suspended driver's license. Deputy E. Mueller arrived on scene to assist in searching the vehicle. The operator was honest stating she had smoked a blunt earlier and there was a small amount of marijuana in the vehicle. The green leafy substance, which later tested positive as marijuana, was located in the center console of the vehicle. The operator was issued a municipal ordinance citation for possession of marijuana and a traffic citation for operating a motor vehicle while suspended.

Item#8

May 28th @ approx. 1:00pm, Deputy Resch and multiple deputies were dispatched to an address on the 1200 block of Hastings St for a report of a possible disturbance in progress. Dispatch advised a red SUV had pulled into the complainant's driveway and were now pounding at their door demanding money they believed the complainant owed them. Deputies arrived to find out the suspect vehicle had already left the scene. Responding deputies searched the area but were unable to locate the vehicle. The victim provided a written statement on the unknown suspects at his door. A neighbor, who wished to remain anonymous, reported observing the incident and provided deputies with a license plate number. The registered owner lives out of county. Follow up is still needed with corresponding county to make contact with the registered owner.

Item #9

June 4th @ approx. 11:30pm, Deputy J. Mleziva and multiple deputies responded to an address on the 700 block of Sunrise Ln. for a physical disturbance. Dispatch was reporting a male had punched the dash on the vehicle leaving a bump on the females head. The female was requesting the male leave the property. Deputies arrived and separated both parties. Written statement obtained from both the victim and suspect. Male suspect was arrested and transported to the Brown County Jail on charges of DVO Battery and Disorderly Conduct.

Item #10

June 5th, at approx. 11:30am, Deputy Coffey, Sgt. Bultman, and Deputy Stevens were dispatched to Webster Ave Market, 1220 S Webster Ave, for a report of a in progress disturbance between the manager and a customer. Notes indicate the agreement was over a gift card. Deputies responded and were able to separate the two parties. The manager reported the suspect was upset his gift card was not working. The suspect was provided contact information to the company that sells the gift cards. The suspect did not like this answer and began causing a disturbance in the store. Deputies were able to verify the disturbance was only verbal and did not become physical. The suspect was issued a municipal ordinance citation for Disorderly Conduct. The suspect refused to sign a no trespassing form at the store but stated he would not come back.

Item #11

June 13th @ approx. 1:00am, Deputy Sanborn was dispatched to an apartment on the 600 block of W Briar Ln, for a report of a Male/Female physical disturbance. The victim was currently at a different location the City of Green Bay. Deputy Sanborn arrived at the victim's location and interviewed the victim. The victim reported her spouse and her got into a verbal argument resulting in the victim being locked out of the house by her husband while on the 2nd floor patio. The victim was forced to crawl back into the house through a bathroom window. Deputies arrived at the home address on the 600 block of W Briar Ln. Deputies entered the apartment with the permission of the victim and spoke with the suspect. The suspect admitted to locking his wife out of the apartment while on the patio. The suspect was taken into custody and transported to the Brown County Jail on the charge of DVO Disorderly Conduct.

Item #12

June 15th @ approx. 3:00am, Deputy Sanborn observed a vehicle on East River Dr near Hoffman Rd with expired registration. DOT records showed the vehicle also came back to a different vehicle that was being operated. A traffic stop was performed on Bellevue St near Hoffman Rd. The operator freely admitted he had a revoked driver's license which was later confirmed with DOT. The operator was asked to step out of the vehicle. During the pat down search a pill bottle was located in the operator's front pocket. The operator admitted marijuana was inside the bottle. June 22nd @ approx. 11:00am, Deputy Resch was dispatched to an address on the 2500 block of Libal St. for a burglary report.
