

BOAT AND CAMPER DISCUSSION

- *I researched the ordinance as far back as December of 2007.
- *In 2008 the board discussed the ordinance in February, June, July and August.
- *The ordinance was not discussed in any meetings in 2009 that I could find.
- *2010 the ordinance was again brought in front of the board. A vote in February for no enforcement or citations until further notice was found.
- *2011 the ordinance was discussed twice in October and November and once in December.
- *On November 20th, 2012 the board adopted the new ordinance 5.03.
- *March of 2013 the board again discussed the ordinance and made changes for the enclosed trailer it was not addressed in the code.
- *On March 19 2013 Mark Roberts, former Code Enforcement Officer- requested direction on how the Board would like him to implement the revised parking restrictions. Pro-active, re-active, by the letter of the law or spirit of the law?
Discussion
 - start with the most egregious cases, go down the priority list. Those we receive complaints on would take priority over others.
 - ease into / provide warning that we will be enforcing
- *November, 2018 I had addressed the board as to how they want the Code Enforcement to be handled and again was advised to be pro-active on the Village codes.
- *At the end of November, 2018 I started sending out notices to the residents who would be in violation regarding boat and camper parking if not moved. A total of 22 letters were mailed out.
 - Out of those 22 letters I received back 5 negative responses.

-Two of those pertained to health issues and an unexpected death in the family. These two families were told not to worry about the campers this year.

-Two responses were negative towards the ordinance in general

-One response was more a question than negative. The letter went on to explain that they would be leaving in late December. They were given permission to have it at home until then.

Questions about wording in the ordinance

1. Remove the wording patio block from the hard surface definition.
2. Tent must be moved in to the 318-3 section for enforcement purposes.
3. Define temporary use to a specific time frame.
4. Remove pop-up campers from the allowable parking year round. They are not appealing to the eye and have no useable reason for them to stay.
5. Section F allowing campers to be parked on the street for a period up to 72 Hours 24 hours should be long enough to load or unload a camper.

Concerns if the ordinance is revised

1. Do we change it for all of the recreational vehicles?
2. Allowing residents to keep the snowmobiles year round?
3. Watercraft including wave runners being allowed to be parked year round?
4. Would they be able to keep an ice shanty on a trailer?
5. Do we start a permit for year round parking with regulations on the campers, watercraft and snowmobiles, etc.?
